Hello everyone and welcome to the 2023 Annual report.

I am now a few weeks into my new role for the Area Chairperson and its great to see what a fantastic Area we are in Clwyd. I would first like to thank the outgoing Chairperson Gareth Jones for his service in his role and recognise the support and guidance he has given to the Clwyd Area over the years.

These are exciting times to be involved in scouting and as you are all probably aware by now, we are transitioning into a new era, with some changes about how we do our volunteering with the main goal being to make volunteering easier. One benefit we will hopefully see from the new way of working, is the formation of Teams in our Groups, Districts and Area to bring together the subject experts from all around Clwyd into the relevant Teams. A benefit of this Teams approach should be that Groups and Districts will collaborate much more with each other, will meet many more new people from other groups and hopefully we will be operating more as a Clwyd family, sharing our resources and experience with each other, more than we have done previously.

One of the key changes is the transition from Executive Committees to Trustee Boards and how Trustee Boards will operate with a focus on Governance and Compliance. I have already met with a few Trustees in the Area and hope to meet up with many more of you over the coming weeks and months, and with the assistance of the Area Trustee Board we hope to offer help and support to Groups with the transition from Executive Committees to Trustee Boards.

One of our main challenges will be to help Groups who don't currently have valid Trustee Boards in place to look at ways to identify and attract volunteers to fill these roles. These volunteers don't necessarily have to come from within scouting, or have had a scouting background, they could be parents or careers, work colleagues or friends. If you know of anyone who is looking to give something back to their community with some of their free time, who may not fancy a scouting leader role, please encourage them to

explore joining the scouting family a trustee.

This year was Kevin's first full year as our Area Lead Volunteer where he shared his vision for Clwyd by producing the Area Plan. The Area Team has taken shape with some critical roles filled, focussing on youth, and they have showed good progress with the Area Plan which Kevin will tell you about in his report.

So, this year will be about continuing to provide the best possible framework of support, guidance, and assistance for all the Clwyd volunteers so that young people can participate in scouting in a safe and rewarding environment whilst gaining the exciting new skills and experiences which scouting provides.

We are privileged to be doing our scouting in one of the best areas in the UK with our local facilities and the great North Wales natural playground for our outdoor activities. I am looking forward to this year and seeing Clwyd Scouting take full advantage of what our area has to offer for young people and our volunteers in getting the best scouting experience possible.

This year has been a fun one and I actually cant believe how fast the 12 months have gone since I took on the role. I remember sitting down with the District Commissioners back in November 2022 and starting to draft out a strategy for the Area wondering if we would ever be able to deliver. We always knew that it was going to be a huge challenge as I think its fair to say that the Area (not Districts) offering was in cardiac arrest so the first twelve months was always going to be about gathering our thoughts, resources and strengths and being very clear on what we are going to invest our limited time and efforts into for the best effect. I like to think that we have had some success but it would be wrong of me to say that its all been plain sailing.

A curve ball for us was when I took the call from Scouts Cymru to ask us to be early adopters for the transformation changes that were coming up across the UK. This threw a spanner into the works for sure because it meant that our deadline had come forward by around three months and our plan had to be revised to fit this. It remains a great honour to be able to do this

Launching the strategy:

In November we launched our strategy for the Area and broadcast it far and wide. Using our new benchmarking criteria, we took a long hard look at the Area and made some objective assessments about where we were and what we could do to improve. These formed the backbone of our strategy stap line #get2good which was the leadership team making a promise to ourselves that our objectives would all be focused on improving our service to drive us to a 'good' status in each of our criteria.

Looking back – the successes:

It's easy to forget the achievements and focus on the negatives so let's sense check on our progress since November.

We said we wanted a clear Area plan that we regularly reviewed and communicated our progress against. In November we launched this plan with an all area invite to attend our online launch. This was successful and the plan is visible. We have attempted to create a plan which tries to achieve the almost impossible task of delivering what I refer to as the three C's of strategy; providing a plan that gives Clear direction and a roadmap of how to get there, is Concise enough that anyone can understand it without lots of work, and Communicated well enough for it to be readily accessible. We have also run a video Area Pulse Check every three months as promised to which anyone is welcome. We have made all this available from our redesigned website .

We said that we wanted to improve communication to the Area. We have done this by ensuring that every month, each member of the Area gets an Area Update sent out by email from myself containing lots of useful information, dates, and updates on the plan.

We said we wanted to make the Area more youth shaped. We have made progress in this by recruiting a new Area Youth Lead, Esme Jones, and incorporating them into our Area Leadership Team and Trustee Board. We have also recruited Jamie Dixon into the Trustee Board. They are both integral in our future.

We said we wanted to run a reunion type event for adult volunteers. This happened in June at Gladstone Scout Camp, and it was a great success with another one planned for 2024. I hope you

can all make it!

We said we wanted to get our event calendar in order, so we switched to Eventbrite and all of our Area events are now available through that system to view and book into.

We said we wanted to deliver online modules 'in house' for wood badge training and we have delivered over 300 hours of training across almost all the core modules this year. We have run, on average, three high quality modules a month for the last year gaining an average feedback rating of 4.8 out of 5.

We said we wanted to fill all the Area roles. This was always going to be a challenge and was made even more difficult when we were selected as early adopters (more on that later). We have recruited a new Area Training Manager, a new Communications and Marketing Lead and a new Youth Lead.

We said we wanted to get ahead of the transformation and not be led by it. We recruited a Transformation team and they have all been doing an absolutely outstanding job, delivering numerous on the ground and virtual sessions and doing everything they can to keep on the pulse and answer questions. This effort led to us being selected as the early adopter Area for Wales and one of only 10% of Areas/Counties in the UK, something we should all be proud of.

We added new blood to the Area Trustee Board, saying goodbye and thanks to our outgoing Chairperson and Treasurer and welcoming new members. The Board is in a really good shape to drive forward positive

change.

A big win this year was handing our over £8k to those who applied for our Area New Horizons fund. This was used to help WSJ participants and the Flintshire Explorers who travelled to Croatia. I encourage everyone to apply for this fund in 2024.

Looking back – the things that didn't go according to plan and what we are doing about it:

Recruitment to the Area team has been slow and very time consuming. Recruiting is always difficult, but I had hoped there would be more interest in Area roles. We will continue to advertise and recruit via all out mediums and options.

We had hoped to run more Area events but a lack of a team and other pressing matters caused us to think again. We are reviewing our calendar and trying to keep a two year rolling calendar up on Eventbrite. I am also asking all District Lead Volunteers to coordinate their calendars and events so that we can work together as best as possible and deliver the best Scouting experience for all.

Looking forward

I am super excited about the next twelve months. We have some really good ideas in the melting pot around Area events and we already have the Annual Awards Evening booked in for January and I look forward to seeing as many of you there as possible.

The next steps must be to continue to grow the Area team to deliver at scale, especially with younger blood, and to stay ahead of the Transformation and lead the way. We have a lot more to do before February when we get our hands on the new tools.

I look forward to continuing to strengthen the bond between ScoutsCymru and Clwyd Scouts Area as I view this as a key support link that runs both ways to get the very best result for all. Its great to see that they have recently restructured, and I have had numerous productive meetings with the new team, especially with Kerrie Gemmill the new Director and Rachel Merriott, the new Head of Scouting Support.

Personally, I really enjoyed the few days this year at Gilwell taking part in my Area Commissioner days, learning what goes on. I also really enjoyed my first SWAT weekend learning to canoe and seeing all of the happy faces on the water for a full weekend of activities!

Receiving my wood beads for the Area Commissioner role was also a real high point and very emotional!

I can't thank everyone in the Area team enough for their help, support, guidance and challenge this year. As someone who is relatively new to Scouting it was an experience to drop into an Area Lead Volunteer role and must get up to speed with everything Scouting.

I am looking forward to another great year for the Area. Thank you for making my first year in post special.

My first 6 months in post have been quite an eye opener!

Already working with two Districts, briefly helping with another so made sense taking on the challenges of all four Districts!

With the new Transformation looming the need was and still is to get training up to date on leaders Personal Learning Plans on Compass.

Area Training has continued via

Zoom with booking through Eventbrite. Area Lead Volunteer, Kevin, has delivered all the training on a regular basis for the modules that aren't available as e-learning or workbook.

Mandatory On-Going Learning has also been a priority to chase too. All members are receiving 60- and 30-day notice emails from The Scout Association as a reminder to complete these. For most this is working well but there are still members that need chasing!

As an Area we are doing well in the grand scheme of things! On monthly reports we showing as about 1% of members are noncompliant.

Sadly, failure to update this Mandatory training has in some instances resulted in the person being suspended from scouting until it is completed. Not something we as a team like to do



but a necessity.

First Aid training continues in various forms throughout the Area.

The Blended First Response course continues to be run via ScoutsCymru.

Initially e-learning via Hampshire Scouts, Trainer led Zoom session with ScoutsCymru followed by a Practical session locally.

Alternatively, Dave Jones (Red Dragon Ventures) continues to run his 'face to face' six-hour First Aid at Work Courses to a couple of Districts.

Overall, I feel we are in a pretty good place going forward to Transformation despite the slight delay with the early adoption.

I look forward to new challenges and see what the new 'Learning' brings from the initial 'Growing Roots' to 'Branching Out'.

In September 2023, I assumed the role of Area Treasurer and have been collaborating with the Trustee Board to expedite the setup of internet banking and access to bank accounts. I'm grateful to Jake Myatt, the former Area Treasurer, for his assistance in this transition.

Our current priority is to work with the new Trustee Board to enhance financial awareness and control, which are essential for effective charity trusteeship. The Area Trustee Board's new structure has already fostered valuable discussions about improving financial controls to achieve excellence.

In 2024, Kevin will present a new budget for the financial year, which we'll review to ensure proper expenditure of our funds. We have also adopted a new reserves policy aimed at gradually decreasing our account balances by spending funds judiciously for the Area, as we currently have more than necessary.

Last year, we allocated over £8,000 to the New Horizons fund, benefiting individuals who applied through our website. Successful applicants received financial support for their activities.

We're exploring the creation of a fund in 2024 to assist adult volunteers in acquiring permits for permitted activities, which incur costs. Further details will be provided later.

The Area Trustee Board has significant potential to support our wide-reaching efforts, and I eagerly anticipate the developments in 2024.
